

In Memory of Fellow VCCA—CAR Member Fred Johnson



Fred D. Johnson, VCCA # 08180, of Buckeye, AZ passed away on March 4, 2021 at the age of 78. He was born in Glendale, CA, graduated from Reseda High School and Chico State College, CA. He served in the US Air Force from 1960-1964. Fred was a Certified Public Accountant and worked for Peat, Marwick, Mitchell & Co, Sacramento City Schools, CA, Lebanon School District, OR, and the City of Silverton, OR. He had a lifelong love of old cars, especially Chevrolets. In high school he drove a 1939 Chevy Coupe and recently found another '39 coupe to add to his collection. Fred joined the VCCA in 1973 and was a member of Sacramento Valley, Willamette Valley, Columbia River & Central Arizona Regions. He served as Treasurer, Newsletter Editor and Director in several of these regions. Fred and his wife Mickie could often be seen at west coast car events in their 1928 Chevy Touring. He is survived by his wife of 51 years, Mickie, two sons, Erik (Amy) and Kevin, one granddaughter Autumn, sister Gwen (Bob) Jensen and brother Dennis (Norma), and many nieces & nephews.

Art & Deb (Rae) Sell's 1936 Master Town Sedan

We found this car at Larry Green Chevrolet in Cottonwood, AZ about 4 years ago. On a vacation to visit my aunt who lives up in Oak Creek Village, we needed to get the oil changed in my wife's car. While we were resigning ourselves to hanging out in the waiting room, I struck up a conversation with the service writer. I mentioned we were involved with the VCCA and could I leave a G & D magazine in their waiting area. Of course he had to ask what it stood for and then volunteered that they had a "vintage Chevy" on the showroom floor. Naturally, we just had to go look.

We found what looked to be an exceptionally well restored '36 Master Town Sedan. Asking what their intentions were since it was on the showroom floor. They said it had been for sale for 2-1/2 years. Oh really, how much, figuring it would be some astronomical dream on number. Yes, it was rather high, but not in the stratosphere. We said we needed to do some research and would get back with them.

Our research through NADA suggested a somewhat lower number, even on a car as nice as this one looked. We went back and forth for a couple of weeks and after that, decided that it was just not meant to be since we were still about \$8,000 apart. 2 months later, they called and asked for \$500 over our final offer. After talking it over for a half hour or so, we accepted.

We arranged for payment and transportation (We were back in Vancouver by then). Getting it off the truck proved to be a little problematic. Turns out in the 2-1/2 years of sitting, the brakes had become inoperable (You know the typical car salesman "ran when parked", and the "driven in local parades"), the battery was dead as well with a non-functioning generator. The truck had one of those platform gates you back onto that is about 3 feet off the ground and then is lowered down. Challenging to get a poorly running car with no service brakes up and over the semi trailer wheel tubs and onto the platform without going off the end and causing serios damage.

It has taken some time to sort out, and the projects continue. The gas tank feed line rusted through inside the tank. (It's a nice looking tank and it ran great with a full tank.). The original cork gas tank float disintegrated—went through the screen, fouled the checks and plugged the carburetor.

This car has no history. They had no spare parts. The story we got was that someone came down from Las Vegas and traded it in on a new car. Our speculation is that it was an inherited car that the family member just didn't know what to do with it or couldn't keep it running. If anyone knows any history, we would love to know about it. If you are familiar with the 1936 Master Series, there are 2 non original features on the outside of this car that may help it stand out and be identified. It possibly was restored some years ago as the brake shoes are the real deal.
